VP's Corner

ne of the most fantastic things about the amateur radio hobby, in my opinion, is how it is self-paced and self-directed. Once you pass that original technician exam, you are on your own to explore in whichever direction you choose. Some people enter the hobby knowing exactly what they want to do with their license, and others enter a world of communications with no expectations because they don't know anything about the hobby and what it has to offer.

My main experience with amateur radio was watching my older sister in Junior High School get her Novice ticket as a member of the ham club. The only way she could reach the repeater with her Icom 02-AT HT was by sitting on the roof in one specific location. If that was the only way I could talk to someone, forget it! I filed away the idea of getting my ticket for a later time.

When my interest peaked again, it wasn't because of PSK-31, digital modes, or CW — I had no idea what those things were — but because I realized the importance of amateur radio communications in a time of crisis. I was working in broadcast radio and loved to get the message out to the public about severe weather, power outages, and traffic problems. Even still, I didn't feel I was able to do enough. With amateur radio, I was going to be able to assist the community I lived in. But once I had my ticket, what did I need to do next?

Most of the people I asked gave me the same response: upgrade to General and get on the HF traffic and ARES nets. I couldn't believe this, I had just gotten my tech license so I could assist and now everyone was telling me I had to upgrade if I really wanted to help! Instead of immediately beginning to cram code into my brain, I took the Emergency Communications Level 1 course offered online by the ARRL. This opened my eyes to what people were talking about. I found the class quite ful-

In the meantime I was lucky enough to be net control for a few events that TARS assisted with, allowing me the opportunity to learn and grow as an operator. With only 18 months in the hobby, I held a General Class license and was participating in the North Florida Phone Net on 3.950 MHz, passing traffic and learning new skills. Much to my surprise, I was

approached about the Emergency Coordinator position for Wakulla County, which brings me to the present. Having just taken on this responsibility, I realize that I decided on a direction in the hobby, and continue to strive for it. 
